Important Solar Eclipse Safety Tips from the Chief Health & Safety Office

Whether you plan to view Monday's solar eclipse with your colleagues or on your own, the Office of the Chief Health & Safety Officer urges you to use safe viewing practices and keep these tips in mind.

Proper eye protection is a must, regardless of whether you're viewing the partial eclipse



from the Port District or in the path of totality. Looking directly at the sun during the eclipse can damage your retina — the part of the eye that sends images to the brain resulting in temporary or permanent damage to your vision.

If you view the solar eclipse, use International Standards Organization-certified eclipse glasses (ISO 12312-2) from a reputable source. If you normally wear prescription eyeglasses, place the eclipse glasses over them. Carefully inspect your eclipse glasses before using and discard them if they are scratched, torn, damaged, or are past the printed expiration dates.

Ordinary sunglasses, even dark sunglasses, are not safe to view the eclipse through. Similarly, viewing the solar eclipse through a camera lens, binoculars, or telescope is not safe unless there is a special-purpose filter over the front of the device.

If you don't have eclipse glasses or specialized filters for your equipment, you can still safely view the solar eclipse using indirect viewing method recommended by experts, such as a pinhole projector, which involves punching a tiny hole on a thick piece of paper or cardstock and placing in the sunlight with the sun to your back. NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory has instructions for making one.

In addition to protecting your eyes, be sure to use sunscreen, a hat and other protective clothing to protect your skin. This is especially important if you are watching the eclipse for an extended amount of time.

If you experience any eye discomfort or vision problems after viewing the eclipse, please contact your healthcare provider.
